

Einstein's Message to FDR

Directions: The following is an excerpt from a letter that Albert Einstein wrote to President F.D. Roosevelt, notifying him of the potential of nuclear chain reactions being used in a new type of bomb. This letter led to the development of "the Manhattan Project," a scientific research program designed to beat Nazi Germany in the race to develop nuclear weapons.
